GENERAL ELECTION




The polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and remain open until 8:00 p.m. Tuesday, November 6, 2018, for the General Election. Electors will be voting for State, Local Candidates, and Ballot Proposals. The Michigan Secretary of State is predicting that the voter turn-out is likely to be <u>very high</u>. In order to expedite the process at the polls, please check prior to election day to make sure that you are a registered voter of the City of Otsego.

PUBLIC NOTICE

FALL LEAF PICK-UP

As the end of summer draws near, it is once again time to think about our annual FALL LEAF PICK-UP.



Dates for the pick-up are the following: 1st Round - October 29th - Nov. 2nd

**Farmer Street & M-89 - Nov. 2nd

2nd Round - Nov. 12th - Nov. 16th **Farmer Street & M-89 - Nov. 16th

**Please do not put the leaves out before October 24th.

Watch for additional announcements on the City's website, in the "Shoppers Guide", and Facebook.

The City's policy is to canvass all streets <u>twice</u> during the two week pick-up period. *REMEMBER: With the exception of Allegan & Farmer Street, all leaves are to be raked into the street next to the curb.* If the leaves are not in the street they will not be picked up.

Please do not place anything *except* leaves in the street. The City places these leaves on a compost pile and therefore, branches, twigs and other yard waste must not be included. (Brush and other yard waste may be taken to the City's Transfer Station at any time free of charge). It is the City's policy to canvass the City two times. If leaves are placed in the street after completion of the canvassing, they will not be removed. It is the resident's responsibility to dispose of the leaves at the Transfer Station.

Winter Parking Rules

Beginning November 1, parking is once again PROHIBITED on any public street in the City of Otsego from <u>2:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m.</u> Parking



is restricted during the months of November through April in order to facilitate snow removal. Violators will be ticketed.

CITY MANAGER'S VIEW

The City of Otsego has recently sold its last lot within Eley Acres. It was a longtime coming, but we are now officially completed with Eley Acres. It was a great experiment and produced an amazing family friendly neighborhood for the city. It started decades ago with the purchasing of farm land and its development into residential lots. The lasting effect was having available residential growth for decades. It provided for a pleasant, diverse and quiet neighborhood. It was difficult at times to have city owned property sitting vacant (not receiving tax revenue) until a buyer became available. But, the ability to provide reasonable housing options for the foreseeable future was vital for the growth of Otsego to what we know it as today. However, like I said we do not have any more room to grow in Eley Acres.

That brings us to today and trying to create the next great neighborhood within the City of Otsego. I am sure

many of you are aware, housing has gone up considerably in the past year or two. There are multiple reasons why that is believed to be the case. I personally think it is the lack of new houses readily available to meet recent demand. This has spurred a sharp increase in the amount of new construction leading to an increase in building materials and making the cost of a new house tremendous. In response many turn to previously lived in houses. That has made that market take off as well. Otsego is not the only community dealing with these obstacles. Just about all of west Michigan has seen a sharp increase in property values. If you have looked at building or buying a house recently I am sure that you are feeling this pain. The City is currently trying to make sure that new residential housing is a real possibility for anyone looking to join us here in the City of Otsego. One possibility of that is what we call the "Armintrout Property". It is a 25+ acre piece of property that the city owns on the northwest end of town. It is heavily wooded, in fact it was previously a Christmas tree farm before the city obtained it through auction. It is a beautiful secluded piece of land that would make for unique building sites. The City will be looking at finding the best way to develop this piece of property into residential

units of some kind. The goal is to alleviate some of the residential pressures this region currently holds. We are trying to hit that sweet spot that is affordable housing, but also is built of a quality that will generate decades of quality housing, similar to what Eley Acres has produced. This may not be simply single family residential, it could be in the form of condos or townhouses as well. We have already had some engineering done to develop the potential layout for a residential development. We are now left with deciding whether we do the development and sell the lots ourselves, or do we sell the land to a developer and have them sell the lots. There are advantages to both sides. More to come on this topic, we will be looking to hear the community's opinion in the coming months. Hopefully, we can have some more information on the costs for either option soon.

Along with the change in seasons, the Otsego Police Department is experiencing personnel changes that will shape the direction of our department for years to come. Earlier this summer Sgt. Kenneth Worstell retired from the Otsego Police Department after serving 46 years. His experience and commitment to the City of Otsego will be greatly missed for some time to come.

Then this October, Detective Bruce Beckman decided to retire after 41 years, with the final 15 years as the only detective the Otsego Police Department has ever had. Bruce has been the key investigator in all serious crimes since that time. Bruce soon became the liaison between the Otsego Police Department, the Prosecutor's Office, and District Court. His investigations included securing search warrants, forensic interviewing of child victims, collection and submitting evidence to the MSP Crime Lab, as well as, interviewing victims and suspects of both misdemeanor and felony crimes. His reputation as a professional investigator earned him an excellent relationship with area Detectives, Prosecutors, Judges, and even Defense Attorneys. Bruce earned his

reputation by working hard, assisting other departments with cold cases and cooperating with area detectives whenever possible. He developed a network that gave him access to crime information not only occurring here but many times in jurisdictions several miles away. He has interviewed suspects or witnesses as far away as Arizona and investigated crimes involving murder, suicide, sexual assault, computer crimes, and child abuse and neglect.

Besides felony cases, Bruce investigates and secures warrants on all misdemeanors and traffic crimes. However, criminal investigations are not the only thing Bruce excels at. Bruce has been involved in every major department purchase with significant input on the department's weapons, video equipment, computers, in-car cameras, and police vehicles. He maintains the evidence room which requires sorting, cataloging, and storage of evidence to maintain the chain of custody necessary for successful prosecution of criminal cases. Bruce's knowledge of the department's computer system, including trouble shooting has been invaluable over the years. He has been a dependable, reliable, professional and an extremely valuable asset to the Otsego Police Department and the community we serve. We all wish a wonderful retirement for him. but at

the same time are a little nervous not to have him here.

With an eye to the future, we are fortunate to have good experienced, professional officers that take great pride in their work and profession. There obviously will be changes and growing pains along the way, but I am confident that through these changes we have the staff in place to ensure we continue to provide the City of Otsego with a Police Department that everyone can feel proud of. To that end, Officer Aaron LaLone has been promoted to replace Bruce Beckman as our Detective. Aaron has been with the Otsego Police Department for 11 years. He is a graduate of Lake Superior State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice.
