### HYDRANT FLUSHING SCHEDULE

The City of Otsego Water Department will flush all fire hydrants <u>October 18 through October 22</u>. This is done to remove any stale water that may be in

the system and <u>ensure that the fire hydrants are working</u> <u>properly</u>. You may experience some reduced pressure and discoloration during this process. If discoloration occurs, let your water run until it clears.

## **FALL LEAF PICK-UP**

As the end of summer draws near, it is once again time to think about our annual FALL LEAF PICK-UP.

Dates for the pick-up are the following:

1st Round - Nov. 1st - 5th \*\*Farmer & Allegan St. (M-89) - Nov. 5th



2nd Round - Nov. 15th - Nov. 19th \*\*Farmer & Allegan St (M-89) - Nov. 19th

\*\*PLEASE NOTE THAT RANDOM PICKUPS MAY OCCUR BEFORE AND BETWEEN SCHEDULED PICKUPS.

\*\*Please do not put the leaves out before October 31st.

Watch for additional announcements on the City's website, in the "Shoppers Guide", and Facebook.

The City's policy is to canvass all streets <u>twice</u> during the two week pick-up period. *REMEMBER: With the exception of Allegan & Farmer Street, all leaves are to be raked into the street next to the curb.* If the leaves are not in the street they will not be picked up.

Please do not place anything *except* leaves in the street. The City places these leaves on a compost pile and therefore, branches, twigs and other yard waste must not be included. Brush and other yard waste may be taken to the City's Transfer Station free of charge. It is the City's policy to canvass the

City two times. If leaves are placed in the street after completion of the canvassing, they will not be removed. It is the resident's responsibility to dispose of the leaves at the Transfer Station.



## FROZEN WATER PIPES

If you experience discoloration in your water or reduced water pressure, *please notify* City Hall immediately at 692-3391. As temperatures fall, our Water Department may advise customers to *leave one faucet running with a <u>pencil size stream of water</u>. Please be aware* 



if it is a very cold winter ~ although temperatures may rise above freezing, the potential still exists for freezing water lines. Do not stop running water until you have called City Hall and been advised to do so. Otsego City Hall <u>must be notified when you begin running your water and</u>



when you cease running your water, for any potential adjustment to be made on your utility bill. Please watch for Public Notices in the Shopper's Guide, our Facebook Page, & Website pertaining to running water. Call 692-3391, if you have a question.

NOW is the time to prepare for cold temperatures and insulate your water pipes. Please be advised that if your inside pipes freeze, it is not the responsibility of the City, and credits will not be issued.



# **CITY MANAGER'S VIEW**

### Addressing Blight in Otsego

City Manager Aaron Mitchell No city or township is immune to blight in the year 2021. It seems like years past it was a rarity that a blight ordinance would even be needed. However whether it is a generational thing,

a cultural thing or something else entirely; blight is now prevalent in all mu-

nicipalities no matter what shape or size. And unfortunately the City of Otsego is no exception.

Blight means a lot of different things to different people. For example: some people feel that the City has no right to limit the amount of old tires they store in their front yard, while other residents believe we have the power to force homeowners to paint their house if we deem needed. The best practice is somewhere in the middle. Our Blight Ordinance was updated a few years ago so it is relevant and prepared to address the issues of 2021. We set a reasonable standard about what is acceptable and what is not. Over the last year or so we have been working on getting compliance from a couple of specific properties. Some of these properties have been blighted for years and we have to begin with educating the property owners about why blight is a bad thing. This has required patience and creativity. We always work for compliance and that takes some flexibility and trust from both sides. Blight complaints can take upwards of 150 days from the time the complaint is filed to receive a court ordered judgment, due to legal requirements. However, once the judgment is issued we can finally take action. Every ticket we write and every court hearing we attend costs the City money. So we try to avoid writing tickets if we can get compliance without it. It usually consists of starting the ticket writing process while working with the property owner to bring the property into compliance. It is slower than we wish, but we usually get there. We have cleaned up multiple properties in

the past year. I am hoping you have noticed some of the blighted properties that have recently been cleaned up. If you have a property within your neighborhood that you feel is blighted and is in need of some attention, feel free to call our Police Department to bring it to our attention.

### Front Yard Parking Ordinance Amendment

The City Commission recently made a small but significant amendment to the Front Yard Parking Ordinance. **Starting on October 24<sup>th</sup>** you will no longer be allowed to park your vehicles (boats, kayaks, snowmobiles, etc.) and utility trailers in your front yard. That includes the parking of non-trailered vehicles as well. This change may raise some questions. Let me try to answer those:

#### Q-Why was an amendment made?

A-There was a small loophole in our previous ordinance that left out small vehicles and utility trailers. We received some complaints of these being parked in the front yard, the previous ordinance had no limitation of them being stored in front yards.

#### Q-Where can I park my boats and trailers?

A-You may still park vehicles and trailers within your side and back yards. You are also still able to park them in your driveway, if needed. You must stay on the driveway though.

#### Q-What exactly is my "front yard"?

A- Any property that is between your street and the closest point of your house is classified as your front yard. The front yard is the only location that you are <u>not</u> allowed to park your vehicles and/or trailers.

We understand that these changes are new and will require some time to comply with. As always, we seek compliance not writing tickets. If you are willing to be flexible and work with us, we will approach each incident with an open mind.

You wouldn't know it to look or venture outside lately, but fall is most definitely upon us. While we've been blessed with mild weather of late, it's only a matter of time before the leaves start turning...and falling, and there becomes a nip in the air. That means that heating season will also soon be upon us.

Heating season means taking a few minutes yourself or having a reputable service provider coming in and tuning up, or at least inspecting chimneys, flues, heat exchangers, and the like to make certain they are serviceable, and furry and feathered friends have not made a nest somewhere that they shouldn't have.

October is Fire Prevention month, which is a good time to check/change smoke detector and/or carbon monoxide detector batteries. These lifesaving devices have a finite

lifespan, and should be replaced according to manufacturer recommendations, typically every 5-7 years. One of the most common "smoke detector/carbon monoxide detector going off" calls the Otsego Fire Department responds to is related to low battery or malfunction due to age. It's also very important to know the difference between the different beeps, chirps, and other tones, and what those mean. This can mean the difference between a life-threatening situation or a benign situation.



Like it or not, winter, and its minion, snow, will be making their appearance in the not-so-distant future as well. This brings with it, the inevitability of slippery

roads and sidewalks. There's no time like the present to start preparing for these conditions, checking and replacing tires on your vehicles as needed; maybe getting up a little earlier to properly clean off vehicles, and allowing extra time to reach destinations; and allowing a little bit more following distance.

On the home front, this means keeping driveways, sidewalks, and steps free and clear for emergency responders, and maintaining free and unobstructed access to fire hydrants on your property.

When traveling, having an emergency kit can prove invaluable. It can mean the difference between being able to remedy a dead battery with jumper cables or waiting in relative comfort wrapped up in a blanket; and shivering while waiting for a tow truck while stuck in a ditch!



From a health/pandemic standpoint, COVID-19 is still an unfortunate reality, although we have multiple vaccine options to provide a modicum of safety. If you have not received your vaccination yet and are interested, most pharmacies and healthcare providers in the area would be happy to accommodate you. As of the first full week in October, guidance has been released related to eligibility for booster doses for those

that have received the Pfizer vaccine. These are available from the Allegan County Health Department for review.

The Otsego Fire Department is always accepting applications from those interested in becoming a paid-on-call firefighter. Residency, training, and attendance requirements apply, but those interesting in joining are encouraged to complete an application. Applications may be downloaded from the City's website under the Fire Department page, or applications may be picked up from City Hall or the Otsego Fire Department during normal business hours.



# 2021 Winter Taxes

Winter tax bills are mailed to arrive on the first day of December. Please note that tax bills are sent to both property owners and mortgage servicers. If you do not receive a tax bill, please call our office at 269-692-2741, and we will send another bill. Residential property owners are encouraged to check their Principal Residence Exemption (PRE) to make sure they are receiving the proper percentage of credit for school operating taxes. If not, please call before December 10<sup>th</sup> and an adjustment can be made for this year's taxes. Otherwise, corrections to the winter tax cannot be made until July of 2022.

Taxpayers wishing to have their tax payments taken directly from their bank account may contact us to set up this service. Payments will not be transferred until December 26<sup>th</sup> or February 10<sup>th</sup>, at the taxpayer's discretion. This will allow us time to make contact in cases where problems **arise**.

Also, please remember that a receipt will not be mailed back for a payment received by mail unless a stamped, self-addressed envelope is sent with the payment. Please keep the top part of the tax bill and check number for your receipt. Also, you may access the City's web site at <u>www.cityofotsego.org</u> to retrieve tax and payment information, as well as make electronic payments.
