CITY COMMISSION PETITIONS AVAILABLE

Petition forms are now available at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, 117 E. Orleans St., for election to the Otsego City Commission. The City Election will be held Tuesday, November 8, 2022.

Three Full Term City Commission Seats

The two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will be elected to four year terms and the third candidate will be elected to a two year term.

Two Partial Two-Year Terms

Terms Expiring in November 2024

At the time the petition is picked up, the candidate must declare what office they will be running for.

In order to qualify for the Office of City Commissioner, a candidate must be: A resident of the city for not less than one year immediately preceding his or her election and a Registered Voter.

Nominations for office are determined by petition signed by not less than 40 registered voters of the City of Otsego. Petitions need to be submitted to the City Clerk's office no later than Tuesday, July 26, 2022, at 4:00 p.m.



HYDRANT FLUSHING

The City of Otsego Water Department will flush all fire hydrants April 25 through May 6. This is done to remove any stale water that may be in the sys-

tem and ensure that the fire hydrants are working properly. You may experience some reduced pressure and discoloration during this process. If discoloration occurs, let your water run until it clears.

SCHEDULE

DOOR TO DOOR SALES

Remember to make sure that the salesperson has a signed permit from the City. Just a reminder that the City is in no way endorsing any of the salespersons or their prod-



ucts by signing the permit. The signed permit only means that they filled out the proper paperwork and a background check has been completed, per the City's Ordinance. If you have a complaint - call the Police Department or City Hall.

City Manager's View

2022-2023 Budget-End of Main Street

The City of Otsego has had an interesting budgeting cycle in relation to its' General Fund these past few months. The growing issues have revolved around a General Fund that has been dwindling due to multiple circumstances. Fortunately we had been able to build a sufficient fund balance due to years of cutting costs and stretching every dollar we received prior to the shortfalls. However, we realized over a year ago that this problem will need resolution sooner rather than later.



This spurred discussions on this topic at City Commission meetings throughout all of '21 in hopes of finding an appropriate method to either cut services or raise additional revenue to secure an appropriate balance in the General Fund going forward. Many options were discussed and the City Commission decided to pursue Public Act 33 of 1951 over a ballot initiative. This was done to provide a resource for not only operation costs but also to retain revenue to replace the 3 fire trucks that are long overdue for replacements. The tentative 22-23 Budget included significant revenue by utilizing PA 33 for operations. As many of you are aware; a petition was submitted by 10% of the property owners in opposition, removing that as a viable option this year and going forward. That required the City Commission to take drastic measures to balance the budget. That drastic measure was to end the Main Street program within our DDA and transfer the DDA back to a capital improvement board; the traditional DDA role. The DDA is scheduled to dissolve in 2023 and will be only using its current fund balance to pay for its maintenance projects for our downtown. This was a hard decision, as many budget decisions often are. There was much discussion on this option and it was agreed upon that this is the best path forward for the City as a whole. It will immediately provide an additional annual \$150K to the General Fund, which will significantly fill the hole. The next steps will be to transfer as many Main Street successes over to City staff. This will rely heavily on the current volunteers that work on Main Street events and projects. This move is not a silver bullet. It does not completely fix the revenue concerns. It does not provide any revenues for fire trucks and it does not completely fill the void within the General Fund (but it definitely helps). Meaning additional long term financial solutions will continue to be researched and discussed. In the meanwhile, this move will stretch out the existing fund balance to continue to provide quality public services to our residents.

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POLICE DEPARTMENT

A new year brings new beginnings and new challenges. I have now been a part of

Police Chief, Brad Misner the Otsego

Police Department (OPD) family for 2 years and could not be prouder of the hard-working, dedicated staff that put the community's needs before their own.

These six committed officers responded to 2,483 calls for service in 2021, up from 2,384 calls in 2020. Those numbers do not include the self-initiated activity such as traffic stops, community engagement, and business, school, and property checks.

Unfortunately, a challenge we have seen in our city over the past year is the rise in vehicle thefts. In 2021, officers responded to 10 vehicle thefts in the city and 16 larcenies from vehicles. We would like to remind our residents to please keep your vehicles locked, do not leave any val-

uables in your vehicle, also, do not leave your keys or key fob inside the vehicle as this makes your vehicle an easy target for thieves.

Now that we are approaching nicer weather, I'd like to remind you we do live in Michigan where road and weather conditions can change rapidly as we transition from winter to spring. As the days start to get longer and people become more active, please stay alert, watch for walkers, bicyclists and motorcycles. Put the phones away to prevent distractive driving so you and those sharing the roadway with you get to your destinations safely.

Your safety is our highest priority. If you see anything suspicious, call 911 to report...together we can stop these crimes from happening in our city.
